12 July 2016 A visit to Rochester

For the July meeting, twelve members visited Rochester Cathedral. We had a very good humorous lady guide who gave us an insight into the history of the Cathedral since its' foundation in 604AD.

She also told us about some of the less well known aspects of the Cathedral. At one point she lifted up a carpet to show us part of the 14th century tiled floor, then she helped us to find the tiles which had been wrongly laid in the choir transept. We were shown the outline of the original Saxon Cathedral which is outside the west door. We admired the baptismal fresco which was painted and dedicated in 2004 to mark the 1400th anniversary of Christian worship on the site and we learnt how a fresco is painted. She also pointed out a wooden door dating from the 11th century, the chapter room doorway and a memorial in the nave, constructed from "Coadestone".



Our guide gave us an account of the lady called Mrs Coade, who in the 18th century perfected a process for making an artificial stone which is called after her. It was used at Buckingham Palace, St Georges Chapel Windsor and many more important sites. A great lady of her time

At the end of the tour we enjoyed a cream tea in the Cathedral tea room.

Mothers' Union meetings are open to all and everyone is welcome, pick up a 2016 programme from the back of the church, and come and help us celebrate 140 years of Mothers' Union. Do join us for our fundraising "tea at three" event on Wednesday 17 August.

On Monday 25th July Gravesend Deanery open a Christians Against Poverty Debt Centre.

Christians Against Poverty is a national debt counselling charity working through a network of centres based in local churches. CAP offers hope and a solution to anyone in debt through its unique, in-depth Debt Help service.

CAP aims to show God's love in action by providing sustainable poverty relief through debt counselling, advice and practical help. CAP's unique 'hands on' approach empowers people to help themselves out of poverty and be released from the fear, oppression and worry generated by overwhelming debts. We are providing sustainable poverty relief as our service teaches clients vital budgeting skills that will last a lifetime.

The charity operates through a growing network of UK debt centres, all opened in partnership with a local church. CAP began in 1996 when John Kirkby, armed with a £10 donation, started to help people in his local community who were trapped in debt.

The charity is now a fast-paced, growing organisation whose vision is to answer the national

problem of debt in the UK by having at least one CAP Debt Centre operating in every major town and city to enable anyone to access its life-changing service.

Carey Laughland is our Debt Centre Manager and this is her account of her first visit.

"It was to a normal street, neat gardens busily being mowed by various neighbours. A had been referred by another debt organisation who were no longer able to help. Having become unemployed and suffered ill health A was now on benefit and was seriously in debt.

The enormity of the task hit me is, in a very short space of time, in this case 2 hours. You learn a lot about a person both directly and indirectly debt related. They have to open to strangers their whole financial situation, this may including admitting they just don't know who is owed what as various debt companies are now involved and they have added their fees etc. Most people are in debt for at least 5 years before reaching out, often they have lived with the "shame" of the situation living a double life of reality and illusion.

Personal details not normally discussed are, letters and statements collected. I very much felt the grace of God during the visit, opening the way, easing conversations. No opinions are given, no judgements, it's a fine line of impartiality and love.

Volunteers needed...

'We always need volunteers... the church runs because of the generous service of volunteers.

If you have time and enthusiasm to spare but you are not sure where your talents can be used, Sue would be glad to meet you for a cup of coffee and to talk through possibilities.

Support to people like A is needed for our Debt Centre in the form of a prayer team and befrienders. Each time I visit a client I need to take a befriender, this is someone who will walk the journeys out of debt with a client, being a friend and showing the love the of God. Maybe sharing a skill, taking them out for a pint and a coffee. A befriender will make three visits with me or about 2 hours each across a 6 week period, after that the contact is very much up to the client and befriender

The need is very real in Gravesend and our centre covers DA11, DA12, DA3, DA4 and DA10. can't put it better that John Kirkby Founder of CAP and so I'll end with some words from him.

"I am overwhelmed by what God has done. To see thousands of lives changed every year is truly wonderful. I do believe that God has given us a 21st Century answer to one of the most pressing social needs within society today. Jesus met people's needs with love, compassion and practical help. Our desire is to simply do the same and watch the miracles unfold. Please get involved in this amazing, God inspired ministry."



Christ Church's lost memorial

This is the second of three tranches of the dead commemorated on the Christ Church World War One Memorial, with further details of the history of the stone in this magazine and in the previous, July, edition.

Of the 60 casualties listed, one in every six died at or from wounds received in the Battle of the Somme, underlining the fierce war of attrition waged there.

Those commemorated were:

Elford, Charles W,

Gunner, Royal Garrison Artillery (Kent Heavy Battery)
Died 20th March 1915 of injuries after a fall off Cliffe Fort,
where he was stationed and on sentry duty. Aged 27, was
buried in Gravesend cemetery.

Son of Thomas (late) & Emily Elford, of Peppercroft Street. Ford, Harold,

Able Seaman, Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve. Died 31 October 1917 at Passchendaele, Aged 23. Commemorated on Tyne Cot Memorial. Enlisted 3 June 1915, drafted to France 27 February 1917.

Son of Isabella Green, a remarried widow, of 72 Peppercroft Street. Born Faversham 1894. Pastry cook.

Fox, Charles,

Private, 2/7 Bn. London Regiment.

Died 20 September 1917, Ypres, aged 20 Commemorated on the Menin Gate, Ypres.

Son of Charles & Elizabeth Fox, of 6 Trafalgar Road. Two siblings. Coach painter.

Garbutt, John M

Private, 7th Reserve Cavalry Regiment (9th and 21st Lancers). Died 5 Jan 1915 of pneumonia in London. Buried Woodgrange Park Cemetery, East Ham.

Son of the late John and Elizabeth Garbutt. In 1911, the family were living at 5 Wellington Street, including four siblings. Solicitor's clerk. Born Madras, India.

Gardiner, William,

Lance Corporal, 1st Dragoons, Royal Regiment of Household Cavalry and Cavalry of the Line.

Died of wounds, 28 March, 1918. Buried Grand-Seracourt Cemetery, Somme.

Career soldier, Son of Mrs M Gardiner, 42 Peppercroft Street, born 1888, one of eleven children.

Garland, George J

Private, 6th Bn. Royal West Kent Regiment

Died in Netley Hospital of Gas Poisoning, 8 August 1916. Wounded in Somme offensive, admitted to hospital 5 July.

aged 19. Buried in Gravesend cemetery, with full military honours. Enlisted 1 March 1915.

Son of Alfred and Annie Garland of 24 John Street, one of five siblings. Painter and decorator.

Gibson, Arthur W Donald, (known as Donald),

Lance-Corporal, 4th Bn, Seaforth Highlanders.

Killed in Action, Battle of Aubers Ridge, 9 May 1915 aged 20, Commemorated at Le Touret Memorial.

Son of Arthur & Susan Gibson, of Rosebank, Parrock Road. Employed by Mercantile Bank of India.

Goatham, Reginald.

Private, 7th Bn. East Kent Regiment.

Killed in Action 3 October 1916 aged 23, Battle of Somme. Commemorated on Thiepval Monument. Son of Horace & Frances Goatham, of 14 Ferndale Road. House painter apprentice.

Gray, Francis W

Private, 4th Bn Middlesex Regiment

Killed in Action 31 July 1917 aged 34. Commemorated on Menin Gate, Ypres.

Born 23 March 1883. Son of Frank & Elizabeth Gray. Two siblings. Married Mabel Gray, lived 31 Alfred Road. Two children: Francis & Leslie. House Painter and paper hanger.

Greener, William E

Able Seaman. Joined RN as boy sailor 25 September 1905 on HMS Impregnable, signed for 12 years as an Ordinary Seaman, on his 18th birthday.

Drowned along with 527 other men, when HMS Aboukir was sunk by German U-Boat 22 September 1914 aged 25. His body was washed ashore and buried at s'Gravenzande general cemetery, Holland. (see Ernest Henniker below, also at Impregnable).

Son of William and Sarah Greener of 15 Christ Church Crescent, born 10 September 1889, one sibling.

Henniker, Ernest E

Leading Seaman, RN. Joined Navy as a Boy Sailor, 30 April 1905 at HMS Impregnable, a Shore Establishment (see William Greener, above).

Died in Zeebrugge Raid, 25 April 1918, when his ship HMS North Star was sunk by a coastal battery. His body was washed up and is buried in Flushing Northern Cemetery (allied Military Section). Had previously been one of just 14 survivors out of a complement of 750 when an accidental internal explosion sank HMS Bulwark on 26 November 1914

Son of Henry & Caroline Henniker, Of Strood, one of ten siblings, born 7 Dec 1879. His sister Florence married Robert Gurr living at 40 Clarence Street, the probable Christ Church connection.

Holden, Albert J

Private 7 Bn Royal West Kent Regiment. Volunteered and signed up for Duration of War on 2 January 1915.

Killed in Action, Battle of Somme, 30 September 1916, aged 35. Commemorated on Thiepval Memorial.

Son of Edward and Ruth Holden of 6 Bentley Street, one of seven siblings. Previously Engineers Mate, working as a Brewery Coppersidesman. Husband to Clara Goldston, lived at 21 Wellington Street at time of enlistment. Two children, Stanley and Vera.

Ives, Albert E

Private, 5 Bn Royal Sussex Regiment.

Died of Wounds 8 November 1916 aged 34, Battle of Somme. Buried at Dernancourt Communal Cemetery Extension. Conscripted August 1916.

Son of Thomas & Elizabeth Ives, of 6 Brunswick Road, previously worked for Frost's Ironmongers in High Street. The eldest of seven children, including five brothers all having fought in WW1.

Lived at 2 Waterloo Street in 1911, with wife Eleanor and daughter Dora.

Joel, Duncan McI

Private, 3rd South African Regiment. Nephew of Edgar Joel (below).

Died (accidentally killed) 10 January 1917 aged 18. Buried at Faubourg d'Amiens cemetery, Arras.

Son of Henry & Annie Joel, of Johannesburg who emigrated to South Africa in 1903. Other members of the family served in the Navy. Grandson of Henry Seath and Sarah Joel (see below).

Joel, Edgar C.

Acting Lieutenant, Royal Naval Reserve, HMS Clan Mc-Naughton. Died 3 February 1915 aged 28, when ship went down in a gale, all crew lost. Commemorated on Chatham Naval Memorial. See also Frederick Benson and Fred Cosgrove.

Pre-war, Merchant Navy gained Second Mate 10 January 1908, Master's Ticket 23 October 1914, shortly before joining RNR, having become engaged to be married. Temporary Commission as Sub-Lieutenant awarded 5 December 1914, Seniority to Acting Lieutenant Awarded 10 January 1915.

Son of Henry & Sarah Joel, of 'Leyland Croft', Old Road East. Henry had been a church warden at Christ Church and there is a memorial window to Edgar on the North wall of the church.

King, Vernon,

Lieutenant RAF, Observer 16th Squadron. Previously Driver Royal Naval Division, promoted Sub-Lieutenant Royal Marines 2 March 1915. October 1917 transferred to Royal Flying Corps as an observer. 11 March 1918, became Lieutenant RAF 16th Squadron.

Shot down 11 April 1918 in an RE8 whilst on Artillery Observation Patrol. Buried Aubigny Communal Cemetery Extension.

Born 28 August 1886. Went to Canada 1901 to farm. At outbreak of war, was working as an entomological expert in agriculture, in Kansas USA. Egyptian Expeditionary Force from May 1915 (Gallipolli), Egypt and Lemnos, then to France 23 May 1916.

Son of William and Emily King, of 36 Whitehill Road. His father and elder brothers Arthur and Henry were Chartered Accountants in Gravesend.

Lambert Wilfred F

Gunner, Acting Bombardier, Independent Divisional Ammunition Column, Royal Field Artillery.

Died of wounds in France 5 March 1919. Aged 28. Buried Ste. Marie Cemetery, Le Havre.

Son of Thomas and Elizabeth Lambert, of Thetford, Norfolk. Born Thetford, in 1911 was a pupil teacher. Address was 86 Wrotham Road at the time of his death.

Lintott, George T

Private, 3 Bn Grenadier Guards

Killed in Action on The Somme, 15 September 1916, aged 27. According to Newspaper Report, a body was found and on it were a family photo and letter from George dated 14 September recording that they were going into action on the morrow and it would be death or glory for them. Commemorated on Thiepval Memorial, so mystery as to what happened to body!

Son of George and Susannah Lintott of 67 Parrock Street, one of six siblings. Joined up 14 September 1914, previously a clerk at Holborn Union, where he may have met his wife to be, Agnes Anderson, a Nursing Sister at Holborn Union Infirmary. Daughter of Thomas and Katherine Anderson of 33 Clarence Place.

Muirhead, Malcolm C

Private, Grenade Company, 5 Bn. Canadian Expeditionary Force,

Killed in Action, 27 September 1916, Battle of the Somme. No known grave. Commemorated on Canadian Vimy Memorial.

Emigrated to Canada, in 1906, at the age of 22, a draper's apprentice. A consulting engineer, like his father, when he joined the CEF 21 December 1914.

Born 6 October 1884, son of Richard & Phoebe Muirhead, of 66 Parrock Street. Eight siblings.



The 100 Anniversary of the First Day of the Battle of the Somme

1st July 1916, remains an important day in the history of this country and Veronica and I were very fortunate to be awarded two tickets in the lottery to join the official commemoration at the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Battle.

I have previously attended commemorations at Thiepval including the 90th, and others in different parts of France and Belgium, but this was the most moving by far.

We were on the Somme for five days and in that time visited some of the 150 cemeteries and memorials maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC). These ranged from Thiepval imposina Memorial the commemorating 72,194 soldiers whose bodies simply went missing or were unidentified in the carnage of the six month long Somme battle, including six soldiers commemorated on Christ Church's own Memorial. to small roadside cemeteries often containing fewer than 100 graves. Two lasting impressions will stay with us: firstly the enormous and devoted care of the CWGC itself towards the sites, with staff at every cemetery and memorial engaged in preparing them to be at their best for July 1st. Secondly and most memorably the number of visitors or 'pilgrims' we met at every site, most of whom had no tickets for any of the Commemoration events, but who just wanted to be there for the Anniversary, each with their own story to tell.

Of course the focus was the Thiepval Ceremony, which many of you will have watched on television. This took place at a time of high security, combined with a venue in very rural France approached only by narrow roads down which



10,000 visitors had to travel. The solution was very French, with the whole area for miles around closed to road traffic, all visitors making their way to a single marshalling point at Albert Airport, where security checks were carried out, then by coach to Thiepval, theoretically a half hour journey. Here we were all supplied with breakfast before and a substantial lunch afterwards.

We were fortunate to be shown to seats near the front, where we were witness to an event both deeply moving and dramatic, projected on giant screens for everyone to have a good view of all events. We were delighted to come across Harry and Evelyn Green also seated in the auditorium. The scene was set with original film recorded during the Battle accompanied by the BBC Symphony Orchestra. French and British Military bands played, Guards Regiments marched, a ceremonial gun salute by the Royal Horse Artillery greeting the arrival of the Royal Party and other dignitaries.

The ceremony itself will last long in the memory, with an inspirational programme unfolding before us. Narrated by Charles Dance, Joely Richardson and Jason Isaacs, it comprised poignantly chosen music and readings, linking back to the battle. As well as war poetry, many of the readings were personal reminiscences, some delivered by descendants of the fallen, with footballer Sol Campbell reading an eye witness account of the death of a member of the Footballer's Battalion. All will remain in the memory, especially a haunting rendition of 'Keep the Home Fires Burning' by the Morriston Orpheus Choir, accompanied by the Band of the Welsh Guards. The formal Commemoration concluded with Charles Dance's moving rendition of 'Aftermath' by Siegfried Sassoon, 'Abide With Me', prayer by the Archbishop of Canterbury, 'For the Fallen' and the two Minutes Silence, which brought a lump to the throats of all present.

Proceedings continued with the wreath laying, and Veronica and I took the opportunity to place a Memorial Cross at the Thiepval Cross of Sacrifice, commemorating those remembered on the Christ Church Memorial. These included Percy Dodd whose name is one of those inscribed on the Thiepval Memorial, and his brother Frank, both family connections of Harry Kingsbury of our congregation.

This battle, part of the war to end all wars with its millions of victims: the dead, and the wounded many of who suffered for decades afterwards including both my grandfathers who survived the Somme, but paid a heavy price; and the vast numbers back home, who lost loved ones, spent a lifetime nursing them, or simply had to cope in different ways from the shortage of men from that generation.....

Funding announced for projects to promote growth and change

Nine dioceses will receive a significant cash injection to support major growth and change projects under Renewal and Reform. The Spending Plans Task Group of the Church Commissioners and Archbishops' Council has awarded £7.8m to projects from nine dioceses from the stream of Strategic Development Funding, which is to be expanded from 2017 as part of Renewal and Reform. This is the third tranche of Strategic Development Funding to be awarded in the 2014-16 triennium and now brings the total allocated through to just under of £15m. The aim of the funding is to complement the formula-based funding distributed to dioceses each year, so they can benefit from additional resources to make a significant difference to their long-term mission and financial strength, by supporting major growth and change activity which fits with dioceses' strategic plans. Proposals will be evaluated throughout to ensure that learning for the wider Church can be captured and disseminated, complementing the new process of diocesan Peer Review, which is also a key part of Renewal and Reform. The funding was awarded after a competitive process, in which dioceses were invited to put forward initial applications to the Task Group. Those proposals which were judged to meet the criteria most strongly were invited to submit detailed project plans. Thirteen applications were received in the first stage, of which eight were invited forward to the second stage, together with one which had undertaken further work on its project plan. All nine projects

have subsequently been awarded funding, complementing the dioceses' own investment in the work being supported. John Spence, chair of the Archbishops' Council Finance Committee, said: "I'm delighted that the Archbishops' Council and Church Commissioners have been able to support some exciting proposals, and help these dioceses turn their strategic plans into reality"

Government support for vulnerable church buildings welcomed

Nearly 300 Church of England parishes are to receive grants for urgent repairs to their church roofs in the second round of awards from the Listed Places of Worship Roof Repair Fund.

Awards between £10,000 and £100,000 have been offered towards the urgent repair of roofs, gutters and drains, failure of which is the principal cause of decay in historic churches. In total, 401 listed places of worship will benefit from awards from the £25 million funding package given by the Treasury. This follows the 501 awards announced in the first round in Spring 2015..

Visiting St Philip & St James, Hallow, construction of which was partly funded originally by Lea & Perrins, makers of Worcestershire sauce, the Bishop of Worcester, Dr John Inge, lead bishop for cathedrals and church buildings said: "These grants will be an enormous help to church communities who take care of some of this country's most precious built heritage. It is very good that the Government has recognised that help is needed."

The Fund, administered by the National Heritage Memorial Fund (NHMF) on behalf of the Department for Culture, Media and Sport, was announced by George Osborne in the 2014 Autumn Statement and subsequently extended for a second round due to heavy oversubscription. Overall, the Treasury has allocated £55 million to the scheme.
