Roadworks, Swine Flu, summer holidays, Teddy Bears Picnic and MU Garden Parties, just when you thought you could sit in the sun with your feet up.

A new series starts this month 'Meet the People of Christ Church' with an interview with Celia our web mistress (the person responsible for looking after the church web site) and there is an interesting article about 'Street Pastors' who will be taking to the streets of Gravesend in August.

Have a good August and let us have your holiday stories to amuse us in the latter part of the year.



In common with other local churches, we will be observing the Bishop's guidelines on Swine Flu, which have been formulated in accordance with the best available medical advice:

1/ Until circumstances change and we are advised otherwise, the advice is to offer Holy Communion in one kind (ie, wafers only). The celebrant will take both wafer and wine in a symbolic act on behalf of the whole

community, and then wafers only will be distributed.

2/ Those administering Holy Communion will adopt the highest standards of hygiene before touching the elements.

3/ For most people, swine flu symptoms are relatively mild. Those who are particularly vulnerable to infection may prefer to abstain from Holy

Communion; some may also wish to abstain from 'passing the peace' and should not be unduly pressed.

4/ If you have flu symptoms, you are advised to stay at home until the infection is over (about 7 to 10 days).

5/ Those who are affected by flu may need a 'flu friend' to collect medication and shopping—we can help one another by offering this kind of practical help. Call Sue on 352643 if you need assistance, or if you would be willing to help.

# Meet the people of Christ Church

An interview with Celia our web mistress.



Q. How long have you been worshipping at Christ Church?

A. I have been coming here for about 5 years.

Q. What attracted you to come to Christ Church?

A. When my Grandma passed away she was interred in the Garden of Remembrance, and to continue to feel close to her, and to try and find some inner peace, I started coming here.

Q. Why are you in a wheelchair?

A. I can't walk - rather stating the obvious there! My disability's full name is Ataxia with Ocular-Motor Apraxia Syndrome Type II, or AOA2 if you want to abbreviate it - and make it easier to say! It's a neurological disorder, and it's progressive. It's also something called an autosomal recessive disorder, which means I got a faulty gene from both parents - unbeknownst to them, I hasten to add. It is pure chance I am the one afflicted because my brother is absolutely fine. Extensive neurological tests were carried out on him and he doesn't appear to be even carrying a faulty gene, which is fantastic. Ataxia basically means lack of balance and coordination, the ocular bit pertains to the eyes (I have trouble with focus, I can't judge distances, and I have very jerky eye movements, not the nice smooth movement 'normal' people have), and the type II bit indicates late onset, and is much rarer than the early onset type I. Just to give you an idea of how rare, at the time of diagnosis 3 years ago I was the only person in the UK to have this, and the fifth case in the world.

I was 12 when I started to notice things going wrong and 17 when I had to admit defeat and start using a wheelchair, so I have known what it's like to walk and run, and the pain is still horrendous. Not coping isn't an option, but I will freely admit I have my days when I want to shout and scream, but it's a case of getting on with it and doing what I can while I can. I have fantastic family support, and without them I'd go to pieces. I get asked 'when will you be better?' a lot. The answer is one word - never. I will never be free of this disease and these wheels. And that makes me want to cry.

#### Q. How do you find Christ Church as a wheelchair user?

A. Access wise it's OK, although I don't quite understand why the entrance at the back of the church was all ramped and smoothed over, and is now not used. I like the fact there has now been a portable ramp bought so wheelchairs can get to the altar rail - I used to feel quite self conscious when the vicar had to come to me! Parking can be a nightmare though. It really annoys me that people who can walk perfectly fine feel the need to park as close as possible.

#### Q. How did you become involved in the web site?

A. Because I volunteered, basically! In this technological age websites are the way to go. I heard Sue wanted a website but didn't really have that much time to do one, so I stepped in.

Q. What is your IT background?

A. Self taught. I got my first computer at about 16, and I just decided one day I was going to learn how to use it properly, so I did what I do best and fiddled around with it, and it fascinated me and I wanted to learn more. I bought books and all kinds of gadgets and gizmos. I went on a few courses in my late 20's to get certain qualifications, and ended up doing my European Computer Driving Licence in about 6 months, when it's an 18 month course! I'm still always learning.

Q. How much time do you spend keeping the web site up to date?

A. I try to log in at least once a week to take off any out of date stuff. Other than that it depends what comes in and how much comes in as to how long it takes. I believe in doing a job well rather than rushing it and it not looking as good as it could; it's my baby.

Q. What is involved in producing the weekly newsletter?

A. The newsletter looks simple enough, but can be a challenge if there's loads to go in, trying to fit it all can be a nightmare, and I have to turn my hand to editorial stuff and rewrite things. Equally so with the weeks where there's only 3 or 4 items and needing to pad things out. Good job I like writing too! Sue provides me with the basics each week, and people email me if they have things they wish to be included, then I just have to fit it all in and make it look pretty - I hope! It's funny because I get more out of doing this and the website than actually being in church.

Q. Is there anything you think Christ Church should know about their web mistress?

A. My favourite colour is purple, and I love Oriental food and chocolate - though not on the same plate!

Thank you for letting us know something about you.

# NEWS FROM GRAVESEND STREET PASTORS

#### JULY/AUGUST 09

Many of you will be aware of the new initiative by local churches, supported by Churches Together in Gravesham, to train and equip Street Pastors to go out on Friday nights to offer pastoral support, care and a listening ear to night-time clients between the hours of 11pm -3am. There are now over 130 towns and cities nation-wide, with Christians undertaking this support in their communities. The Street Pastors have the support of both the local Council and Kent Police. We hope in time that this project can be extended to further nights.

A team of 21 volunteers from our local churches have just completed approximately 40 hours of training on Saturdays over the past 5 months and will shortly be commissioned to go out on to Gravesend's streets in teams of four or five. The training has been very comprehensive, including mentoring, drugs, alcohol, the role of the Police, probation service etc. During July each team has gone out in plain clothes on a Friday night 's surveillance of the town to find out what to expect. Fortunately Gravesend is very well patrolled by the Police and by excellent CCTV coverage by the local Council and teams have been much encouraged by their experiences.

Over the past two weeks there have also been visits to the new North Kent Police Station, to be shown around by the town centre's Police Constable. The light, modern building has state of the art equipment. The visit included seeing the custody suite and a realisation of how much quicker modern technology has made the process of analysing fingerprints, DNA and even footprints using a national database of information to aid in the apprehension of criminals. Arrests made today can normally be processed in about three and a half hours. The arrival of a violent prisoner during the visit gave a strong reminder that whilst the custody block was quiet on our arrival, the Police are regularly dealing with incidents of a more disturbing nature.

The teams have also been fortunate enough to visit the CCTV control room at the Civic Centre and see how incidents can swiftly be managed to protect the public at large and keep Gravesend streets safe.

Shortly the Street Pastor's uniforms of jackets, caps and fleeces will be arriving and during August each team will be making their first uniformed patrols. YOU ARE INVITED TO THE OFFICIAL LAUNCH on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30pm in the Pembroke public house, in King Street and a welcome is extended to all of you to join in the worship, celebrations and commissioning, in the presence of Les Isaac, Director of Ascension Trust, the head of the Street Pastors' movement.

Above all your *prayer support* for this project is urgently needed. We are seeking a **Prayer Co-ordinator** to organise teams of people at base each Friday night to pray for the

safety of the Street Pastors and the people they encounter of the streets, together with the issues they carry. If you are inspired by what you read, please consider prayerfully if this is a call for you and contact us. We also need people to pray regularly for the project within their homes and a prayer leaflet will be introduced to encourage you to support in this way.

Lastly we need financial support. It costs about £140 to fully equip a Street Pastor with uniform, which is a lot to ask each Street Pastor to find in addition to donating their time, plus the £300 training fee. There are also the costs of supporting the administration and running of the course and the project itself. Please, if you can pledge a donation send your cheques made payable to Gravesend Street Pastors, 55 Windmill St, Gravesend. In addition, could your church plan and hold a fundraising event in the future to support this worthy cause? It was possibly an electrical shop before we had it and possibly a hairdresser's before that.

#### How many staff do you have?

There are 4 staff and we can draft in extra staff for busy occasions. What do you offer to customers?

We have fresh flowers in at all times: from a Dutch suppliers twice a week and we also go up to Covent Garden.

We offer fresh flowers, bouquets, basket arrangements, hand tied, wedding & funeral flowers between 9 & 6 Mondays to Saturdays and 10-3 on Sundays. We also run a local delivery service. We can be contacted on 01474 359080. What is it like running a business in Echo Square?

We are well established now and trade on word of mouth. We are known for being reliable and always having freshly made up arrangements. Our busiest times are Valentines Day, Mothers' Day, Easter and Christmas. Convenient parking is also useful here.

### Do you feel ChristChurch is part of the community?

Yes. We used to have more to do with ChristChurch when Father Joe King was there and used to see him quite often. We have supplied flowers and Christmas trees to the church in the past.


A friend told me recently that a transfer from a pastoral priest to a writer can be seen in the text of the book.


#### GARDENING TIPS FOR AUGUST

It was not a very good July weatherwise and most of us did not have to reduce Kent's water reserves to any great extent. However this month can be a very busy time in the garden. Containers must be watered and fed, weeding should be undertaken and dead heading of all flowering plants should continue throughout to obtain good results. Unless you have been watering lawns, reduce mowing and do not lower the cutting height of your mower.

If you have not already done so now is the time to attend to your Wisteria. Those several foot long shoots should be cut back to two buds from the main stem and if the plant is becoming a wild mass it can be severely pruned to fit in with the size of your garden.

If you have been growing strawberries and their runners have rooted, these can be potted up and will provide good young plants for next year.  $$_{\rm AD}{\rm AM}$$
