

A Churchwarden's Notes

I am writing these notes the day after we gave the congregation our plans for Christ Church for the next two years. As a member of the Finance and Buildings Committee of the PCC and spokesperson for it yesterday, it occurred to me that it may be a good time to push home in the Magazine the message regarding the financial affairs of the church. It is after all where we all come into direct contact. We may not all be involved in the other four aspects of church life as presented on Sunday, but we certainly get involved at this part - the part where finance is concerned.

There can be little doubt that, as one of the Gravesend churches, we are relatively well off. That being said, it is also true that in order to keep the church running, we have some very hefty regular payments to make. It is this that we are trying to address with the publication of a small leaflet next month. Briefly it sets out to show that, although our income just about keeps up with our outgoings, we have very little in reserve for eventualities. In common with running a house, these occur at what are generally inconvenient and often expensive times. This is of course magnified when we look at the size of the building here ...

Some good news. One of the urgent projects to be tackled is the extension of the Garden of Remembrance - now fast becoming full. It is a much-visited and loved area, and we are now in a position to extend it. We put out an appeal to those we could contact; and it is now likely that we have sufficient money to get on with the work. We would thank all who gave, often most generously.

Every month we have what we call our Working Party, when volunteers turn up for an hour-and-a-half to give Christ Church a good "wash and brush up". On those occasions we also tackle some of the maintenance jobs needed. There are two jobs which, with our aging workforce, we would dearly love to tackle, but cannot. One is to clear out the guttering round the church (not the really high stuff, I hasten to add!) after the leaf fall; the other is to carry out a couple of small paint jobs, one of which is in the tower. We would welcome with open arms any young(ish) volunteer who could give us an hour or so to help with those two jobs. It is a good social occasion: you even get a cuppa! Please get in touch with me.

Christmas is almost upon us - Fete notices are out! Does it come earlier every year?

NEWS FROM GRAVESEND STREET PASTORS SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 09

Have you ever attended a Christian service in a pub? It sounds strange, I know, and whilst I am aware of pub-based Alpha courses and Bible studies, I certainly have never attended a service in a pub!

Last Wednesday 16th September was certainly a night to remember! The Commissioning of Gravesend Street Pastors was a night when The Pembroke in King St, was almost filled to capacity with in the region of 200 Christians, Police, Council representatives and folk from other arenas too. It was a night when the rafters almost shook with praise to God through the singing of well-known hymns - a night of witness to the pub's staff and clients and a night when Gravesend's first 20 Street Pastors were commissioned and received their caps. It is believed to be the first Commissioning ever to have taken place in a pub. (Aberdeen beat us by doing theirs in a nightclub!). One person told me that it was near enough to their idea of heaven - a pint in one hand, football on the television and singing Cwm Rhondda at the top of their voice!

The DJ stand was transformed into a pulpit, adorned with flowers and banners announcing the event and from here the event was led by Reverends Andrew Lindley, Chair of Churches Together in Gravesham and Michael Fanstone, Chair of Gravesend Street Pastors. Following the lusty singing of "To God be the Glory" and the story of the Good Samaritan from the Message translation, greetings of support for the new Street Pastors' project were given by Chief

Inspector Phil Painter of Kent Police,

Councillor John Cubitt on behalf of Gravesend's Community Safety team, the Deputy Mayor, Councillor William Lambert MBE and Mr Adam Holloway MP, who made a sudden appearance, having given apologies that he would be in Afghanistan. The Director of Ascension Trust, Mr Les Isaac, gave an encouraging and amusing address with some anecdotes of encounters he had had with people out on the streets at night and then the Street Pastors were given their caps, having made promises about they way in which they would serve the project, a very special moment indeed.

After a time of refreshments and catching up with family and friends, the Street Pastors gathered together with Les, for a few words, a prayer and then they were led out in full uniform for the first time on to Gravesend's streets. Being a Wednesday night, they were uncertain what to expect, but it seemed that those they encountered asked who they were and thought that this would be a very welcome addition to making Gravesend's streets safer for the public.

On Friday 18th September most of the Street Pastors gathered at the Methodist Church for prayer at 10.30pm, upheld by a number of folk willing to join the prayer teams. They set out at 11pm in four teams taking different routes and soon engaged in conversations with door staff, clients of pubs and taxi drivers. They were accompanied by a reporter from the Gravesend Messenger,

observing and photographing. A number of girls gratefully received pairs of flip flops, no longer able to walk in their stilettos. After a break for hot drinks at base, the teams went out again, assisting people rather the worse for wear to taxis and responding to alerts to minor incidents from the G-safe radio from Gravesend's CCTV control room. The finale was to respond to an argument following a fight in a nightclub and being able to step in and help to separate and calm people until the Police arrived, which made the Street Pastors feel they had really arrived! Back at base at 2.45am there was a final debriefing and prayers, before returning home, on a real high and with heads buzzing. Praise to God that all had gone well!

I am pleased to be able to report that we currently have two potential prayer


co-ordinators, a real answer to prayer, and that the response for the prayer teams has been good, with 30 offers to pray at base on a Friday night and a number of others willing to pray from home. More would still be welcomed, as would names of anyone who would like to train as a Street Pastor in the next training round, or offers of help with IT technical support (perhaps by phone), publicity and particularly with fundraising - whether an event or applying for grant funding. Christchurch sits firmly in Echo Square and we are investigating this over the next few months by interviewing people whose lives make up this community.

This month I visited Jessica at the cafe **Del-icious**.

Jessica is running the cafe for 3 months while the owner, Claire is away. How long have you been at Echo Square?

About 5 years. We also had shops at The Lion Roundabout and in Perry Street but they are closing down.

Why did you choose Echo Square?

I don't know why they chose this place except that it has always been a cafe as far back as I know. It was Rolands and then Browns before us.

What can you tell me about the building?

Nothing really. There is a kitchen out the back and a flat owned separately upstairs. (Does anyone reading this know anything more?).

How many staff do you have?

Just me at the moment and Rosie the Saturday girl. When she comes back Claire will be here and sometimes Derek who owns it with her.

What do you offer to customers?

We have a shop selling cakes, sandwiches, bread, crisps, drinks, hot food and savoury goods.

Then there is the cafe which seats 20 people inside and a further 6 outside. We offer all that the shop sells in the cafe plus breakfasts (including vege. breakfasts) and tea or coffee.

The sandwiches and most fillings are made in the cafe, fresh daily. The bread comes from South East bakery daily and the pies and cakes are from Greggs in town.

I try to vary the cakes I order from day to day so there is something different for regular customers to choose from.

We use the window to advertise cakes which our cake maker will make to order for weddings, baptisms and birthdays. She likes 1 to 2 weeks notice and more for bigger or more complicated cakes.

What is it like running a business in Echo Square?

It is generally a nice place to be. We get on well with the other shopkeepers but running a food place is not consistent. The demands vary from day to day and it's not easy to know how much we shall sell on any one day. Parking can be an issue because people often park outside and run in to buy something.

The roadworks have really affected us. It has been much quieter while they are here. People find other places to go and we don't know if they will come back again.

Do you feel Christ Church is part of the community?

I don't have much to do with the church myself but the ladies and a few men come on a Wednesday morning and I miss them if they don't come! Sometimes the drivers come down for a drink when there is a funeral at Christ Church. That "nice gentleman who has been doing the church garden" always comes. He is the only person whom I let make his own drink if I am busy!!

GARDENING TIPS FOR LATE SEPTEMBER & OCTOBER







September: The last month of summer and the beginning of autumn.

A transitory time. Already plant growth is slowing down as the nights begin to draw in and although the summer annuals are still looking colourful, by the end of the month it will be time to remove them, being replaced by spring and flowering plants and bulbs.

Once the September rains have moistened the soil Perennial Herbaceous plants can be divided and replanted. Ideally New shrubs and trees can be planted during this month and the next two whilst the soil is still warm.

The warm soil will encourage their roots to grow and become well established. It will be an advantage to add organic material to the soil at this time with the addition of a slow release fertilizer such as bonemeal.

Of delight and a tooth

"Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me." Mark 9:37 (>From the Gospel for Sunday 20th September)



I am not normally lost for words, but I was this morning. Trying, as reverently as I might to give the congregation communion I was completely floored by the triumphant presentation of a tooth, just extracted by a six-year-old on the way up for her blessing. Perhaps I should have been aware of a suitable blessing for such an occasion, but sadly I was stumped. Clearly the Liturgical Commission of the Church of England has a task to complete. I can assure you that I have been buzzing since, but the results are all far too dreadful too share.

There is something utterly disarming about childlike pleasure, and the discovery of something new. What was commonplace to me, was an 'event' of the first order to this little girl, and she required that others take notice, to join in her delight, and recognize a landmark on her life journey.

I think we make too little of the idea of delighting. There is so much that we can find to rejoice in, not least at this time of the year as harvests are now gathered in and the fruits of labour counted. Delighting in things is a profoundly Godly thing to do. Right at the beginning of the Bible we find God taking delight, not just on the seventh day of creation when He rests, but on each stage of its creation as he sees what has been achieved to that moment, and no doubt anticipates what has been enabled, and what is to come.

But true delighting takes time, and that is often our problem. To delight on something you have to be sufficiently disciplined not to be running on to the next thing. We have to be capable of savouring moments, because they are precious if we are to learn Godly fulfilment in our lives and our surroundings. We allow ourselves to become too busy, often as we are striving to achieve the next thing, and as a result we fail to recognise achievements, and landmarks as God sees them.

Jesus took a little child to Himself and gave a blessing. In doing so He was taking a delight in the child, and I cannot help wondering just how many gaps there were in the grin He received in return.





Lance and John Betjeman

The Best of John Betjeman

Lance brings the Gospel story to life in the Bible's own words. This is a dramatic and powerful way of hearing the Gospel story. Lance doesn't stand still or read from a lectern but with simple movement

Lance tells the story of Betjeman's life through his funny, moving and always interesting poems. Through Betjeman's heartbreaks and triumphs Lance paints a picture of a changing twentieth century England.

Featuring Betjeman's most famous and significant poems including 'Slough', 'A Subaltern's Love Song' (Joan Hunter Dunn), 'Diary of a Church Mouse', 'Hunter Trials' and 'In a Bath Teashop.'
