## **Confirmation**

### **Debra Barden**

Since settling in Gravesend with my husband and starting a family Christ Church has become a big part of my life, taking the children to the First Steps pre-school services since being babies and being involved with all the family activities that go on there. I am looking forward to being confirmed and being able to take part fully in the communion services as I begin my faith journey.

### **Harry Kingsbury**

Harry was born in 1922 and had early experience of God through Boys Brigade. Although his brother and sisters were confirmed, somehow he missed out through his involvement with the Methodist church. His childhood was happy but with plenty of hardships and at 15 he became an indentured electrical apprentice. At the age of 17 he caught a fleeting glimpse of Joan and it was love at first sight! During the war Harry served in the RAF, and he and Joan were married in 1944. After demob he returned to his old company and progressed eventually to become MD and Chairman in the 1970's. In 2007 Harry and Joan moved to Gravesend to be near the family, which was quite difficult for them.. and shortly afterwards Joan fell ill and died in the Hospice last year. Harry describes this as the absolute worst time of his life. It was at this time that God came back into his life (though he had always been religious – he remembers an experience of God at the age of 7, and that he knew God was there when he was saved from electrocution at least 3 times). He has found comfort in the prayers and the fellowship of the church and after a short time, confirmation called.

## **Tola Mao**

My name is Tola Mao, I come from a Buddhist family and have lived most of my life in Cambodia where I grew up. I moved to England about 6 years ago and recently joined Christ Church, Gravesend. I have learnt a lot since my experience with Christ Church and I know I still have a great deal to learn.

I had my baptism on the 27th of June and I hope with this new found life in Christ, I will grow strong in faith and love for God.

## **Liz Ripley**

I am 31 and have been married for almost 7 years now. We now have a beautiful 7 month old son who is such a ray of sunshine and completes us. The day of our First Steps service has whizzed around again and it dawns cloudy but bright with a little warmth. This early summer's day has promise but I'm not taking anything for granted! I feel slightly hurt at that but on our way up to Church the clouds gather and it starts spitting and spotting with rain! I'm not saying a word!

Today in our service we are thanking God for our Hands and Feet and thinking about the good things that we can do with them. all the things that we are able to do. And, using hands and feet (and eyes!) it's time to look for those hiding animals. They're keeping very, very quiet but the children soon find them and then everyone joins in as we sing, "Here come the frogs, hopping round the pond" using our hands to be hopping frogs, pecking birds or wriggling worms. And we say "Thank you" to God for frogs, for birds, for worms and for children! Our next song is "The ants went marching one by one", and a chance to use our feet again. The children show us how clever they are at marching and Laura is even bouncing happy, smiling baby Oscar on her lap, in time to the music. We are so lucky to have these happy times together! They are special and precious and they are one of God's gifts to us.

After all the lovely jingly noise it's time for a little bit of hush as we say our prayers; and then with candles blown out, into the Hall we go for a well-earned cuppa and the possibility of some fancy biscuits. Oh goody! Our naughty little sheep and his friends come out into the Hall too, making themselves comfortable on the hatchway. They always enjoy watching the children play and sometimes they even join in! And our naughty little sheep discovers that Mollie has brought her little sheep to meet him. Her name is Jessie and they hit it off straight away. He hopes that she'll come again though I'm not sure what Chloe will make of that! The children have had a lovely, happy time playing together and Mums have had a chance to catch up with each other and maybe even make new friends. 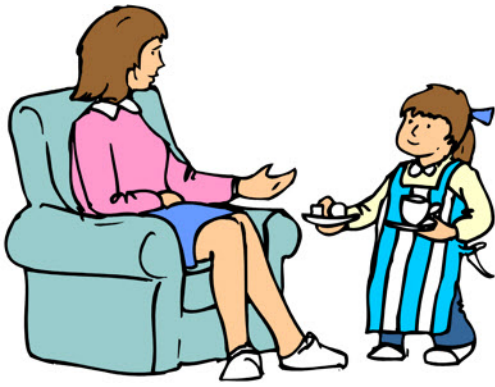

# JUST A MOM?

A woman, renewing her driver's license at the County Clerk's office, was asked by the woman recorder to state her occupation. She hesitated, uncertain how to classify herself. "What I mean is," explained the recorder, "do you have a job or are you just a ....?" "Of course I have a job," snapped the woman. "I'm a Mom." "We don't list 'Mom' as an occupation, 'housewife' covers it," said the recorder emphatically. I forgot all about her story until one day I found myself in the same situation, this time at our own Town Hall. The Clerk was obviously a career woman, poised, efficient, and possessed of a high sounding title like, "Official Interrogator" or "Town Registrar."

"What is your occupation?" she probed. What made me say it? I do not know. The words simply popped out. "I'm a Research Associate in the field of Child Development and Human Relations." The clerk paused, ball-point pen frozen in midair and looked up as though she had not heard right.

WHEN a serious fire broke out on a cargo vessel in the port of Antwerp The Mission to Seafarers was on hand to arrange emergency accommodation and support for the sixteen-strong Syrian crew.

The 1974-built City of Berytus was in port unloading its cargo when, in the middle of the night, a fire broke out. The men on board immediately had to evacuate the vessel whilst the port authorities attempted to contain the blaze. The fire was so severe that it was left to burn for three days in a controlled fire, meaning the ship was only suitable for scrap.

“Because of the seriousness of the fire the crew left the vessel with only the clothes they were wearing,” John says. “I took them to the Antwerp Seafarers’ Centre where a store of second-hand clothing is kept and each of the crew members got kitted out in clean clothes. We also provided them with a Mission to Seafarers’ telephone card so that each man could reassure his family at home that he was safe. Fortunately, none of the crew was injured in the fire.”

Whilst some of the crew went back to the ship to see if they could salvage some personal documents, Mr Attenborough took the rest of the crew to a local laundrette to wash their smoky clothes and then to a nearby supermarket where the Mission purchased items such as toiletries for the men.

“All of the crew were very grateful for the help the Mission in Antwerp was able to provide,” said John. “It was clearly a horrifying ordeal for the men to endure, but we have been able to support them emotionally and physically through it.

“Many of the crew were concerned that they would not receive their wages or compensation for the loss of personal items and asked me to speak with the local branch of the International Transport Workers’ Federation. This I did and I was pleased to report back that they would be paid what was due to them and be repatriated home.”

“I am full of admiration for the efforts that John Attenborough and his team have gone to in supporting the crew of the City of Berytus. The work of the society is often quietly performed, but when emergencies happen, our chaplains are ready to step up and meet the need as required. Seafarers do not carry many personal belongings with them and so those items that have been lost in this fire will cause anxiety and heartache.”
