



Sermon: **Sunday 6 October 2019** Luke 17 5-10

Our reading this morning from Luke's gospel starts with the disciples asking Jesus to increase their faith and Jesus reminding them that if they have even a tiny amount of faith they can achieve extraordinary things.

Perhaps to us this seems rather a mixed metaphor, but Luke guotes Jesus as saying, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you." The important thing is that Jesus is saying you don't need a lifetime of faith, you don't need a degree in theology, you don't need enormous faith...just a tiny step of faith (a mustard seed is the tiniest of seeds of course) so just a tiny step of faith will take you a long way.

I don't know about you, but I find that very re-assuring! So often we doubt whether we can make a difference, we doubt our trust in God, we don't feel good enough to advise, to help, to do something which requires a step of trust, which isn't guaranteed, which requires an act of faith. Jesus is saying, "Go for it", "Have a go", "trust you can do it, make it happen and you will".

It's very easy to say to someone else, or to ourselves, "Have faith!" but it's quite another thing to really believe it and to

Thinking about this passage reminded me of the 16 year old Swedish climate activist, Greta Thurnberg who has been leading calls for action on climate change and who has been in our media a lot lately.

She made an impassioned speech in front of world leaders at the 2019 United Nations action summit in New York in which she accused them,

'You have stolen my dreams and my childhood with your empty words,' she accused them of ignoring the science behind the climate crisis, saying: 'We are in the beginning of a mass extinction and all you can talk about is money and fairy tales of eternal economic growth - how dare you!'

No one could fail to be moved by her passion and her commitment!

Back in 2018 she said, "Every Friday, I miss classes to sit outside my country's parliament. I will continue to do so until leaders come into line with the Paris agreement" And more recently she told the world's schoolchildren,

"I'm striking from school to protest inaction on climate

change - you should too"

Greta has Aspergers and says this means I am sometimes a bit different, but it doesn't give her the excuse to say I can't do that; it doesn't make her think I'm only 16 years old, no-one will take any notice of me.

No. she has faith that she has seen a need she needs to speak out on and already you can see she has made a difference. And thank goodness she has because quite frankly, we adults haven't done much! We haven't heeded the warnings, we haven't had faith we can act now and make a difference. Let's face it, it won't be us that has to cope with our apathy and lack of action, it will be the Greta's of this world, our children and our grandchildren. Thank goodness she believes she can get something done!

So I believe that we should be re-assured by Jesus' words that even if our faith is small, new, hesitant, unrefined, we can still achieve extraordinary things.

The second part of this reading is perhaps more challenging. It talks of faithful service but set in the context of a society which is used to the idea of slaves. It seems to us perhaps quite unfair that we should come in from work and expect someone else, a slave, to serve our meal (especially when he too has been working) and that we shouldn't say, "come and eat with us"...is that not what Jesus' new commandment is all about? Loving the marginalised, mixing with all sorts of people, not being snobby about who does what?

But I think here, in the context of life at the time Jesus was living and teaching, he was perhaps saying, just as you expect your slave to fulfil his task, so you too should fulfil

This also set me thinking about present day life. It is all too easy to think of slavery as something that happened centuries ago and nothing to do with modern life, but the Diocese of Rochester (and they are not alone in this) has been looking at present day slavery for several years now and it is sober reading!

They wrote at the outset, "More than 200 years after the abolition of the slave trade there are still an estimated 40.3 million men, women and children trapped in modern slavery, and up to 136,000 potential victims in the UK alone.

The Diocese of Rochester is working in partnership with The Clewer Initiative and the Gangmasters and Labour Abuse Authority who are resourcing them to raise awareness to help end modern slavery: they believe that the tools to end modern slavery already exist within the local community and that the Church, which is present in all communities and at the heart of many, has a primary responsibility in leading these efforts. They are helping Rochester to develop strategies to detect modern slavery in our communities and help provide victim support and

In the Diocese of Rochester this looks like creating a team of anti-slavery advocates who are delivering training and awareness raising events. The Diocese is also working closely with local police and other organisations to do

everything they can to support the fight against modern slavery in the local area. The Clewer Initiative are honoured to be partnering the Diocese of Rochester and such a committed team of staff and volunteers, working hard to bring an end to modern slavery in the diocese.

The fight against modern slavery can only be won if we band together, and there are ways everyone can get involved

Do you use hand car washes? You may not know that they are a big risk sector for modern slavery. The Clewer Initiative have created an app with law enforcement called Safe Car Wash which you can use next time you go to a hand car wash. Download Safe Car Wash from your app store, and when you're at the car wash, open the app and answer a few simple questions. You may be prompted to call the Modern Slavery Help line to report what you have seen.

Jesus came saying that he proclaimed freedom for captives. Freedom is something that we take for granted, but it is the gift of God, it is the purpose of God. Those who purposefully constrain, confine and traffick and enslave people will face the judgement of God for their terrible sins. I guote here.

"Yet even more serious is when we choose not to see: when as it were we put on our own blindfolds and don't see those around us who are held in slavery, oppressed, trafficked, in other peoples' power.

The Clewer Initiative is funded by the Clewer Sisters, an Anglican order now based in Cuddesdon, Oxfordshire. The order was founded in the 19th century to help vulnerable, mainly young women who found themselves homeless and drawn into the sex trade.

There are also now pockets of slavery in nail bars; immigrants working in the fields and shamefully housed in crowded, filthy caravans and others imprisoned in houses to cook and clean and rarely allowed out.

Bishop Simon Burton-Jones, Bishop of Tonbridge, has encouraged Christians to '.pick up the baton in our generation' from the likes of William Wilberforce - a key figure in the abolition of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. Speaking at a recent Modern Slavery awareness event in Gillingham, Bishop Simon said how shocked figures like Wilberforce and John Wesley would be, 'to know how deep, cruel and pervasive today's slave trade is, in an era that prides itself on its sense of fairness and justice.'

So where does all this leave us?

The Knife Angel at Rochester

The knife Angel has been created as a National monument against violence and aggression at the Ironworks Centre British Oswestry and is a memorial to those whose lives have been affected by knife crime. It is a 27ft high sculpture, which Alfie has designed and created singlehandedly using over 100,000 knives surrendered and collected nationwide amnesties in 2015/2016. The angel began it's tour around the UK in 2018 when it was housed outside of Llverpool Cathedral for December and January in order to raise awareness of the impact of knife crime on society, the victims and their families and friends.








As part of the tour, a conference on knife crime was held at the Historic Dockyard Chatham.

At the conference, participants called on the government to ban the sale of pointed domestic knives.


