Advent Reflection



Advent is a wonderful time of year in the Christian Church, first of all it marks the beginning of our annual liturgical journey, then it sets us out on a path of reflection and expectation as we wait for the coming of Christ, both at his incarnation but also at the end of times and finally we get revel in the calm that we get from prayer and preparation for the big day in bizarrely 3 1/2 weeks' time.

Sadly, though we are alone in the waiting. Those around us will be putting up the Christmas tree, attending parties and using this time to generally make merry and the paradox is that they expect us to join it, saying "oh come on its Christmas" making me want to shout back "Advent". We are taught that joy comes to those who wait and yet society seems unable to do that anymore. With Advent starting so late many people started putting up Christmas trees in the last couple of weeks, well before Christmas Eve when I normally put mine up. What does this say about society when all they want to do is celebrate and do anything to have fun, without recognising that by doing that they steadily diminish the joy that they receive.

Expectation, waiting, and preparing makes us all the more ready to have a party at the end of the process. It is like the process of studying, revision, taking of exams and then

the waiting for your results, it makes the celebration of your achievement that much more real and worthwhile. This is a concern because as humans we need to have fun, we need celebrations. It is no accident that Christmas was transferred to the Northern Hemisphere wintertime to give people something to look forward to in the cold winter months. But our society just wants immediate gratification and in doing so they will lessen the joy that should be Christmas, whether Christian or not the opportunity to decorate homes, party together and swap gifts should be a fun and enjoyable time.

I know this makes me sound a bit like a humbug and I am happy to wear that moniker because I think it is important to have that time of preparation and waiting, because I want my joy and fun to be that much more enhanced.

This is what Advent is there to do for us. It is a time for us to prepare. It is a time for us to take stock of what is important in our lives and to then make those things the focus for our celebration. It is a time for prayer and meditation in order that you can reflect and be ready for your heart to be open to receive Christ in whatever form he might come. We don't know in which form he might come. Last time he came as a child, then a refugee, then a carpenter, then a preacher and healer and finally as a criminal. What might he be next time? Perhaps all of the above again and the question that Christ is asking in his Gospel is will you be ready?

I don't think I will be but that's part of why I will spend the few weeks preparing. We know that we can all become frantically busy during Advent as we get ourselves ready with all the practical thing, but it is as important to prepare our hearts and mind to be ready to meet our Saviour whenever he comes.

POSADA

What is posada?

Las Posadas is an Advent celebration with origins in Spain, now celebrated chiefly in central America Posada is Spanish for "lodging", or "accommodation"; it is said in the plural because it is celebrated more than one day in that period.

The tradition commemorates Joseph and Mary searching for accommodation on their arrival in Bethlehem. People will re-enact the couple's arrival and

the refusal of innkeepers and potential hosts. There are a number of traditional verses which are sung between characters.

Posada customs have been adopted elsewhere using a pottery figures which 'visit' different homes and institutions in a parish.

A Christ Church Posada

We have a posada model ready to travel around the parish this advent. Mary and Joseph will be starting their journey on Advent Sunday as they travel to Bethlehem.

The figures of Mary, Joseph and their donkey represent the presence of Christ with all travellers and homeless people.

Would you be willing to take the Posada to stay in your home for a night or two? During the visit the model can be displayed prominently - you may want to invite neighbours family and friends to receive hospitality, and join in advent prayers and hymns, and maybe contribute to a charity that supports the homeless, refugees or children; you may just wish to use the figures as a focus for your prayers overnight. There are no expectations other than your prayers. Some people take Mary and Joseph with them when they visit other homes.

We hope that Mary and Joseph will also visit local schools, as well as some of the businesses on Echo Square- calling in at Larchwood, Springwood Corner and anywhere else they will be made welcome. If you do take the posada home please arrange with the next person on the list to hand them on. It is your responsibility to hand the posada figure onto the next home. Please make sure you note down the arrangements and telephone numbers.

The artwork is by Tessa Campbell Fraser and is presented in partnership with Messums. Visitors are encouraged to marvel at these majestic animals and consider how the current climate emergency may impact on these exceptional mammals.

Accompanying Whales will be a bumper programme of events and activities inspired by the sea. There's music from the BBC Big Band, an evening of Sea Shanties and, for families, the chance to hear about Jonah and the Whales. Tickets for these events and many more are available on our website.

Whales opens at Rochester Cathedral on the 10th February until the 7th March. Admission is free during the day but charges apply for schools, groups and special events.



Budgeting for 2026

Money is probably the last subject we want to think about in December. We are very aware that the cost of living increases will be hitting all members of the Christ Church congregation. However we do need to keep in mind that the Church is not immune from these pressures. The Church also has to meet rising costs, particularly maintenance and energy.

We also have to contribute to the cost of the Vicar and the support services of the Rochester Diocese. We are the body of Christ, we are the Church. If Christ Church is to continue to thrive, and continue to have a place in the life of our community that means paying our way. Fortunately we

are part of the Rochester Diocese where costs are shared – at present that means that our costs can be subsidised by others – this may not always be the case and it is far from ideal. The PCC believes, at the minimum if we want Christ Church to have a full-time Vicar we should aspire to paying that part of the costs in our contribution to the Diocese. It could take a few years to get there but that is one of our targets, at the moment we meet about 75% of that.



Below you will see how we calculate our running cost, you will see there is a short fall- at present we are able to use other income streams, such as hall rents to help the balance the books – that

means that we cannot always deal with some of the long-term issues when an aging building and contents need attention.


