

#### The Lambeth story

News is usually slow in July and August, the summer was often described as the 'silly season'. Journalists looked for content in stories disproportionate to their significance or drew conclusions where there were no conclusions to be drawn or just got things wrong.

For most people the Lambeth Conference, the ten-yearly meeting of Anglican bishops in August, will have been a smallish column somewhere inside their newspaper – after all there is little news when church decides to talk about sex. Others decided to make a meal of it and headlines dragged up stories and attitudes from a long time ago. Being the age of social media many felt this was a good moment to get in on what was simmering.

This is a shame because in some ways the Lambeth story is bigger than that because the bishops meeting in Canterbury had a more motivating agenda and offered significant support to churches which face challenges far greater than any the Church of England finds itself dealing with. The Bishops heard from many different situations: churches facing persecution, the greater impact of climate change, war, refugee crises and more. Some Bishops would have been returning to uncertain and dangerous conditions where their own lives were in danger.

For many relationships of support have been renewed - and encounters with our companion dioceses from Zimbabwe and Tanzania will have been important for our incoming Bishop, Jonathan. (There is a very positive story about support which has been given in the past when our companion dioceses have faced governmental corruption and persecution in Harare). It was also the opportunity for some groups in the diocese to renew those links, not least the Mothers Union who encountered Bishop Given from Kondoa at the Cathedral on Mary Sumner Day.

Which makes it all the more lamentable when the impression is given that the greatest energy was spent attempting to push back the progress that has been made on attitudes to same sex marriage, identity and relationships. For the first time at a Lambeth Conference there were bishops present who were willing and able to speak openly about their own stories of same sex love, companionship and marriage. There was no final statement, resolution, or call on these issues. It was stated that at present there are different approaches in the Anglican Communion which should not be allowed to break the ties of unity. For some Bishops this was a sufficient summary of where things are up to, for others, sadly, this impaired communion was expressed in a refusal to share communion. The Lambeth Conference does not set policy for the churches which attend but the way issues are addressed will affect the way the church is perceived as people read their news.

Christ Church's commitment to inclusion was made very clear when I was appointed as Vicar, as was its longing for the time when we will be able to offer equality to all who seek the sacrament of marriage. At present the Church of England is on a journey of discernment called *Living in Love and Faith*. For many of us this will feel like a Holy Saturday period as we long for the light of Easter and the new possibilities of change. Like the disciples we may feel bruised and apprehensive because the timetable is unclear and old arguments have re-emerged that have hurt people, but our hopes are what we cling onto. In the meanwhile we are called to get on with the very real mission opportunities that God gives us – by offering an inclusive welcome in our church, by standing with those who feel excluded, anxious or forgotten in a time when there is so much trying to worry us in our world. St Paul wrote that Christians should be judged 'by their fruits' – the challenge for us will be how we cultivate love, joy and peace as we offer God's inclusive love to all.
